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March 11 Meeting: The Roots of "the Valley of Heart's Delight"

The next meeting of the Milpitas Historical Society will be held at 7:00 pm on Wednesday, March 11, in the Multipurpose Room (Auditorium) of the Milpitas Library, 160 North Main Street.

The speaker for the evening's presentation, Thomas Shepherd, is related to and has stories about two of the best known agricultural families in the Santa Clara Valley: the Pellier fruit growers and the Mirassou wine grapes growers. In the early 1850s, Louis Pellier, (1817–72) a San Jose orchardist, successfully imported young prune trees and the techniques for growing them from France. The prune, a species of plum most suited for drying, was brought over, by request, by Louis' brother Pierre Pellier in a trunk. Once established, it became a classic of the fruit industry.

The Mirassou Winery was founded in 1854 by Louis Pellier and his brother Pierre (1823–94) also in the South Bay area, and for many years was an icon of the agricultural heritage of the Santa Clara Valley. In 1881 Pierre Mirassou (1856–89) married Pierre Pellier's daughter Henriette (1860–1937); that family was responsible for the well-known Mirassou wine of this area.

Until the 1960s, the Santa Clara Valley was the largest fruit-producing and packing region in the world, with 39 canneries. Prunes were a major crop; the valley was producing the majority of prunes in California by 1900 and shipping them internationally.

The overwhelming beauty of the plum and other fruit tree blossoms in the spring were what earned this area the name, "The Valley of Heart's Delight."

In the course of a brief regular business meeting, President Bill Hare presented an Honorary Service Award (with lifetime membership) to Catherine Pelizzari for producing the newsletter and recruiting speakers for the meetings for the past decade; California Assembly member Kansen Chu also presented her with a Certificate of Recognition for her services.

After the dinner, journalist, historian, and author Gregory Nokes talked about the subject of his latest book, *The Troubled Life of Peter Burnett*. Peter Hardeman Burnett was born in Tennessee in 1807, raised in rural Missouri, and was self-educated in law and government. In 1843 he joined the westward movement to move his family to Oregon, where he farmed for a while and was elected Oregon's provisional legislature between 1844 and 1848. In 1848, he rushed to California, along with so many others, for gold, and he made a little money. Then he made more selling land for John Sutter. In 1849, he was elected California's first Governor, even though California did not officially become a state until 1850. In 1851, he resigned, frustrated by legislative opposition to his views, including horribly racist ones.



Burnett held a surprising number of short-term positions after that, including serving briefly as a justice in the California Supreme Court between 1857 and 1858, and as a member of the Sacramento City Council, as well as becoming a San Jose-based lawyer, and then the president of the Pacific Bank of San Francisco. He died in 1895 at the age of 87 in San Francisco.
