Wednesday, November 14: Our Next Meeting's Program on an Undiscovered Treasure of Local History

The upcoming meeting of the Milpitas Historical Society, on Wednesday, November 14, will take place at 7:00 pm in the Multi-Purpose Room (Auditorium) of the Milpitas Library, 160 N. Main St.

The "treasure of local history" we will be exploring is San Jose's Ashworth-Remillard house, built by James Ashworth, a gold rush pioneer who acquired 250 acres of farm land in 1854 on the east side of Coyote Creek, and built the house in 1860 for his family. Later, the house was sold by Ashworth to Peter Remillard, an immigrant from Canada, who had also participated in the California Gold Rush and had founded a Bay Area brickyard in 1861. After he purchased Ashworth's house in 1891, Remillard established another brick-manufacturing business on the grounds of the house. After his death, his daughter, Countess Lillian Remillard Dandini, inherited the house but did not live there, and she eventually transferred it in 1968 to a longtime friend and neighbor, who, in his old age, in the 1990's, was unable to keep it up. Until it was discovered by our speaker, Sue Cucuzza, its fate seemed dim. It is the story of all these interesting people, as well as that of the changing fortune of the house itself, that make this story so remarkable.

Field trip to Rengstorff House

The Milpitas Historical Society's next field trip will be a tour of Mountain View's beautiful Rengstorff House. This historic structure, designed in the Italianate Victorian style, was one of the first houses to be built in Mountain View. It was built around 1867 by Henry Rengstorff, a prominent local businessman who operated a ferry between San Francisco and Mountain View.

Remembering Marilyn Hooper Simpkins

September 21, 1930 - October 16, 2018



Marilyn Hooper Simpkins, daughter of Thomas Preston Hooper and Margaret Grace Hooper, was born on September 21, 1930 in Oakland CA, where she was raised and attended St. Elizabeth high school, from where she graduated in 1949.

Throughout the late 40s and 50s, Marilyn was very active with the Oakland chapter of the USO, where she met and married her first husband, Vernley Hester. They had 4 children together. They divorced after 13 years of marriage. Marilyn remarried in 1977 to David Simpkins of San Jose.

Marilyn began her working career at age 16 with JC Penny in Oakland, and later went on to work for Liberty Mutual Insurance and Jefferson Standard. In 1972 Marilyn found her professional calling with Hope Rehabilitation Services, where she remained for 35 years, retiring in 2007. Never one to sit idle, Marilyn went back to work after retirement taking a part time position with De Anza College.

Always one to put community first, Marilyn served as a United Way Coordinator in 1994-95. She was also very active in other community organizations such as: St. Elizabeth church Ladies Guild, the Committee to save Hayes Mansion, Milpitas Historical Society, the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), Campbell chapter, and the Milpitas Senior Center. She enjoyed discovering new places with longtime companion Richard Tait, with whom she traveled to all 50 states, as well as Canada, Mexico, and Europe.

Marilyn is survived by 4 children, Jerilyn Hester Aldrich of Grass Valley, Kelli Hester Woodruff of Manteca, Kevin Hester of Grass Valley, and Scott Hester of Alameda, 14 grandchildren, 17 great grandchildren and longtime companion Richard Tait of San Jose.
