## The Stories of Milpitas Parks: Augustus Rathbone Park



Augustus Rathbone, for whom this park is named, was born in 1818 in Rhode Island, where his fifth great-grandfather migrated to British Colonial America in 1620 on the "Speedwell," a ship accompanying the Mayflower. Augustus was the oldest son (but fourth child of eleven) of Stephen Kilton Rathbone and Sarah Waterman Brown. Despite being an eighth-generation Rhode Islander, the siren call of the California Gold Rush brought Rathbone west in 1852-1853.

In July 1854, Rathbone was appointed U.S. Postmaster of Alviso Township, but the post office was actually located in Milpitas. This means that Augustus Rathbone preceded Frederick Creighton as Milpitas's first postmaster; Rathbone's store, in which the mail was delivered to townspeople, was on the southwest corner of the same intersection as French's Hotel, to be later called the Milpitas Hotel. Rathbone also was one of the organizers who founded the Republican Party in Milpitas in 1856, and it was in Rathbone's store/saloon that the townspeople gathered to drink in celebration of the 1860 election of President Abraham Lincoln.

After 1870 and before or about 1880, Rathhone sold his business and moved to Santa Clara, after which he was living in San Jose until his death in 1909. (continued on next page)

The Augustus Rathbone Park is one of the newer public parks in Milpitas. It is located at 386 Expedition Lane, which can be reached via Trade Zone Boulevard and then turning north onto either Momentum Drive or Journey Drive to access Expedition Lane. The new Mabel Mattos Elementary School on McCandless Drive is located on the west side of Montague Expressway, and the park is located on the east side of the Expressway. McCandless Drive and Trade Zone Boulevard connect at Montague Expressway.

While of modest size, this newer park provides a grassy open play area, modern play equipment, and several benches from which to watch your children play, as well as several tables that are generously covered to provide shade on sunny days and shelter from sudden rains (admittedly rare here). There are some trees, but of course they have not yet achieved their fully mature size. There is also an impressive large statuary artwork with indigenous animals peering from its heights at one of the park's corner access paths.
