

Local Author Publishes New Book About Our Area

Local author Robin Chapman, who has previously spoken at our Milpitas Historical Society meetings, has just (last summer) published a new book on the fascinating history and pioneers of our Santa Clara Valley, in its early days known as The Valley of Heart's Delight.



California's first immigrants from Mexico were astonished by its beauty. The land is moist, and the hills have an abundance of rosemary and herbs, sunflowers in bloom, vines as plentiful as a vineyard, wrote one. From the movie stars of Hollywood's golden era who once came to
