Our Society's new collaboration with the Saratoga Historical Foundation


The Milpitas Historical Society is announcing the next meeting of the Saratoga Historical Foundation, which will be on Tuesday, March 25th, 7PM in the large facility in Immanuel Lutheran Church at 14103 Saratoga Ave in Saratoga (there is plenty of parking).

IEEE Life Fellow and Distinguished Lecturer Paul Wes-ling is guest speaker. Following his extensive research into Bay Area history, he brings us back to the 1910s -- to angel investors in new technology, the sinking of the Titanic, local ham radio operators trying to break RCA tube patents, Fred Terman and Stanford University, the local invention of high-power tubes, WWII and radar, William Shockley's mother living in Palo Alto, and the San Francisco Bay Area infrastructure that arose. These factors determined that the semiconductor and IC indus-tries would be located in the Santa Clara Valley and that our Valley would remain the world's innovation center as new technologies emerged -- computers, then their software, mobile, biotech, virtual reality, autonomous vehicles, and now artificial intelligence -- and we would become the model for innovation worldwide.

Come find out about the "secret sauce" that permeates our Valley, and some of its colorful characters -- Cyril Elwell, Lee De Forest, Bill Eitel, Charles Litton, Fred Terman, David Packard, Bill Hewlett, and Bill Shockley.



About the Presenter

Paul Wesling has observed the Valley for decades as an engineer, executive, resident, and educator. He received degrees in electrical engineering and materials science from Stanford University, and then worked at companies including Lenkurt Electric, Sperry-Univac, and Amdahl, and in 1985 joined Tandem Computers in Cupertino. Paul retired from HP in 2001, after which he served as "Mr. IEEE" for the San Francisco Bay Area for 10 years. He is a Life Fellow of the IEEE (Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers) and he has received the IEEE's Centennial Medal, the Board's Distinguished Service award, the Society Contribution Award, as well as the IEEE's Third Millennium Medal. He edited a roadmap for prediction of technology directions in electronics packaging.
